Module 1

Sustainability and integrated reporting – assurance determinants and relationships

This module introduces the concept of sustainability assurance (and nonfinancial assurance more broadly) and examines the determinants and consequences of assurance over sustainability and integrated reporting information.

Drawing on agency theory, we examine relationships important to the assurance process, stakeholder demands for assurance over sustainability, and integrated reporting information from voluntary and nonvoluntary perspectives.



Module 2

Assurance Framework concepts

Value is derived from assurance when it has a rational purpose and meets the information needs of intended users. This module introduces the various sustainability assurance frameworks (including the EER assurance guidance document) and their respective elements and outputs. This includes standards issued by the IAASB and AccountAbility. Considerations for assurance to meet the requirements of a rational purpose are also examined.

Pre-conditions for an assurance engagement are explored to round off this session, together with different definitions of 'materiality' for sustainability reporting purposes and how this translates into materiality for assurance purposes.

Module 3

Assurance scope and measurement criteria

'What must be assured?' is a common question when contemplating sustainability assurance. This section of the course explores the importance of defining the subject matter (or scope) for an assurance engagement and the process for adopting and defining criteria for reporting and assurance.

This module also considers different approaches to what aspects of reporting are to be assured. An 'interpretive model' is explored which considers how assurance over systems, controls, processes, data and disclosures are coordinated, to inform decision-making and ensure sustainable value creation.

Sound reporting infrastructure as the platform for assurance readiness

This module examines the building blocks for an organisation to be 'assurance-ready' and covers:

- sustainability and integrated reporting frameworks and motivating factors for their adoption, including a view on how these frameworks align with each other
- sustainability and integrated reporting policies and procedures and key considerations for developing appropriate assurance policies and practices
- sustainability and integrated reporting systems and controls including their evaluation in terms of the COSO model
- governance and oversight roles and responsibilities, with a focus on how to develop an organisational-wide assurance strategy



Module 5

Combined assurance and the future of sustainability assurance

This final module examines the concept of combined assurance as a coordinated effort of multiple lines of defence within an organisation, in addition to understanding the different levels and types of assurance possible for sustainability and integrated reporting.

Alternative approaches to traditional assurance exist, especially within the context of sustainability and integrated reporting. These alternative approaches with a focus on stakeholder participation and activism, are explored.

The future of sustainability and integrated reporting is looked into as the last part of this section of the course, considering these aspects:

- The need for a mandatory regime for sustainability and integrated reporting assurance
- The use of comprehensive sustainability reporting standards and evidence on the benefits of sustainability and integrated reporting assurance

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


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
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
